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

The Year in Review

Engaging art exhibitions, creative opportunities, and the expansion of our collections and staff facilities served as a source of inspiration in 2014. From the elegance of *Passport to Paris* to the bold themes and colors of *Beyond Pop Art: A Tom Wesselmann Retrospective*, the Denver Art Museum invited and inspired people to share, comment, and create.

Inspiring people in 2014 began with *Passport* to Paris, the trio of exhibitions that took visitors into three distinct moments in French art, won the museum a Tourism Hall of Fame award for drawing visitors to the region, and was the impetus for the largest gift of art ever presented to the DAM. *Nature as Muse* featured the impressionist collection of Frederic C. Hamilton, chairman emeritus of the Denver Art Museum's board of trustees. After lending his masterworks

for the exhibition, Hamilton was inspired to bequeath to the DAM this stunning collection of 22 landscape paintings by Claude Monet, Berthe Morisot, Camille Pissarro, Pierre-Auguste Renoir, and Alfred Sisley. This transformative gift will enable visitors to enjoy the collection in perpetuity.

In 2014, we immersed visitors in a host of exhibitions exploring the creativity of artists—the engaging realism of *Daniel Sprick: Fictions* so mesmerized visitors that the exhibition catalogue was reordered to keep up with demand. *Modern Masters: 20th Century Icons from the Albright-Knox Art Gallery*, a collaboration with the Clyfford Still Museum, brought to Denver some of the most iconic pieces of 20th-century art and elicited rave

reviews. A dual presentation between the Denver Art Museum and The Metropolitan Museum of Art brought *The American West in Bronze, 1850–1925*—the first-ever full-scale exhibition of western bronzes. This year, our curators were inspired to present collection-based exhibitions that offered new ways of looking at the museum's holdings. *Rebranded: Polish Film Posters for the American Western* looked at the ways artists behind the Iron Curtain used advertising for this familiar genre of film to express opinions about political realities through universally recognized Western symbolism. *First Glance/Second Look: Quilts from the Denver Art Museum Collection* presented a return of pieces from the museum's collection of quilts and provided inspirational creative opportunities in the Thread Studio. *Photography & Vision: The Influence of Joyce and Ted Strauss* highlighted masterworks and experimental pieces gifted to the museum. *Printed & Painted: The Art of Bark Cloth* transformed the museum's Oceanic gallery with a variety of creative uses and ingenious construction of this unique medium.

Finally, the museum celebrated more than 40 years of inspired collecting and presentation from Joseph de Heer Curator of Asian Art Ronald Otsuka with *At the Mirror: Reflections of Japan in 20th Century Prints.* Otsuka, who retired at the end of 2014, joined the museum in 1973 and led the museum's Asian art department for four decades, expanding the museum's Pan-Asian collection with incredible pieces that tell a more contemporary story of Japan. In 2013, Otsuka received the very high honor of the Foreign Minister's Commendation from Japan's Ministry of Foreign Affairs for his cultural service. He now serves as curator emeritus to the museum.

In-person artist encounters expanded with the help of a National Endowment of the Arts grant for our native arts Artist-in-Residence program. Artists Rose Simpson, Jeffrey Gibson, and Linda Aguilar worked with our visitors to develop new art. Other opportunities to create and engage onsite included the *Summer Is...* installation on Martin Plaza that asked museum visitors and passersby to contribute their own summer inspiration. The museum also launched new Drop-in Drawing and Drop-in Writing programs designed to inspire spur-of-the-moment creativity.

In 2014, the museum expanded its reach outside our museum walls. Distance-learning tools assisted our education team in serving students with virtual classrooms and webinars. Known as a leader in creative engagement of visitors of all ages, the Denver Art Museum presented *Tapping Creativity and Becoming Part of Something Bigger*, a report funded by a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services that shared a road map for other museums to maximize their capacity to foster visitor creativity.

We also completed a key staff project several years in the making. Generously funded by private donations, the museum's Bannock Building for administrative staff was completed in March 2014. Designed around how the staff works and collaborates, this building

has encouraged creativity, teamwork, and efficiency. The Bannock Building's contemporary design won a 2014 Colorado Merit Award for Built Architecture from The American Institute of Architects.

We continued to engage visitors with tools and artists in an array of media—from the art of sketching in the Drawing Studio that accompanied *Passport to Paris*, to 3-D creations in the Sculpture Studio that highlighted *The American West in Bronze*, *1850–1925*, and our summer celebration of all things three dimensional. These hands-on experiences had a deep and positive impact on visitors.


One story clearly illustrates how the museum creates transformative experiences with art. Max, an 11-year-old boy who contributed to our Community Quilt, was inspired by his experience. Diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder and largely non-verbal when he and his family created his quilt square, Max was transformed by seeing his work on display on the soaring Hamilton Building wall. Max started creating more and inspired his schoolmates to develop a "Light it Up Blue" celebration and art show to further autism awareness.

In a 2014 letter to the DAM, Max's mom said he felt so empowered by his Denver Art Museum experience that he wanted more kids to have access to the arts and creative materials, so they launched Blue Ribbon Arts Initiative, a foundation to provide access to musical instruments and cultural experiences. "And to think, it all started with a quilt. The museum made a difference in the life of one child, who is now on a mission to make a difference for many more... The display did more than boost his ego, it changed his life."

Logan Lectures Series (DAM Contemporaries)

The Logan Lecture Series, now in its eleventh season, continued to bring world-renowned contemporary artists to the museum to discuss their work. The 2013–14 season featured eight artists, including Oliver Herring, Brad Kahlhamer, Kent Monkman, Ernesto Neto, Judy Pfaff, Araya Rasdjarmrearnsook, Bud Shark, Masami Taraoka, and Lin Tianmiao.

Oliver Herring TASK party at Untitled #65

For Untitled #65 (Say Anything), German-born, Brooklyn-based artist Oliver Herring, whose work was on display in the Hamilton Building's Logan Gallery and Fuse Box, facilitated one of his trademark TASK parties. Participants wrote imperatives on slips of paper, put them in the "TASK pool," and subsequently selected tasks from the pool and acted them out according to their interpretation. Examples of tasks that were pulled from the DAM pool include, "Start a drum circle" and "Serenade the person to your left with the 'Let it Go' song from *Frozen.*"

Kevin Trainor at Untitled #69

Pop artist Tom Wesselmann, whose work was on display at the DAM this summer in *Beyond Pop: A Tom Wesselmann Retrospective*, moonlighted as a country music singer and songwriter. At *Untitled #69 (Uncharted)*, Denverite Kevin Trainor performed some of Wesselmann's original songs, of which there are more than 400. Trainor played and recorded music with Wesselmann years ago in New York, where the artist lived and worked. With Trainor's help, the DAM was able to showcase the artist's little-known talent as a lyricist and musician.

NATIVE ARTS

Native Arts Artist-in-Residence Program

In its third year in the studio in the third-floor American Indian galleries, the Native Arts Artist-in-Residence program hosted three artists: basket-maker Linda Aguilar, ceramicist Rose B. Simpson, and multimedia artist Jeffrey Gibson. Each exhibited their art, demonstrated their process, and visited with museumgoers about their work.

Native American Art Studies Association Conference

The native arts staff hosted the 2014 NAASA conference at Denver Art Museum and the Denver Public Library. Chief Curator and Curator of Native Arts Nancy Blomberg presented a paper on the early history of the native arts department and participated in a panel discussion on collecting American Indian contemporary art. Associate Curator John Lukavic moderated two panel discussions including the conference's plenary session with leading contemporary artists and a session on museum artist-in-residence programs.

In conjunction with the NAASA conference and with the support of Vicki and Kent Logan, the native arts staff presented an original performance by Kent Monkman at the Denver Art Museum in October 2013.

Development Report

The Denver Art Museum's board of trustees and members of the development committee gratefully acknowledge the contributions of the generous donors, sponsors, and members who supported the museum's exhibitions and programs in 2013–2014.

This year was marked by many transformational contributions to the museum, notably the 22 impressionist paintings from the Frederic C. Hamilton collection, the largest gift ever given to the museum.

The collection was on view in Nature as Muse: Impressionist Landscapes from the Frederic C. Hamilton Collection and the Denver Art Museum, part of the trio of the Passport to Paris exhibition. The museum's annual beacon show, *Passport to Paris*, was generously presented by Delta Dental of Colorado and was additionally made possible through the contributions of Wells Fargo, Adolph Coors Foundation Exhibition Endowment Fund, Stockman Family Foundation, Fine Arts Foundation, Larimer Square, and William LaBahn. The following generous funders also provided significant exhibition support throughout the year: the Helen K. and Arthur E. Johnson Foundation, the Terra Foundation for American Art, the Americana Foundation, Christie's, the Sylvan Stool Family, and Geraldine R. Cohen for The American West in Bronze, 1850-1925; an indemnity from the Federal Council on the Arts and the Humanities, U.S. Bank, Snell & Wilmer, and John Brooks Inc. for Modern Masters, a collaboration with the Clyfford Still Museum; the Eleanor and Henry Hitchcock Foundation for *Epic: Joseph Stashkevetch* Drawings; and the E. Rhodes and Leona B. Carpenter Foundation for At the Mirror.

New acquisitions support for the museum collections included underwriting for two media works by Oliver Herring funded by the Florence and Ralph Burgess Trust, a nendo Cabbage chair funded by the Ralph and Florence Burgess Trust, as well as a Joseph Stashkevetch drawing A Beautiful Fall, 2013 through Eleanor and Henry Hitchcock and Singer Family foundations.

Major funding to support collections care was received this year. The museum received a prestigious challenge gift from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation to create an endowment for the textile art conservator position. This fund was matched by the Avenir Foundation, Sharon and Lanny Martin, Mary Ellen Anderson, the Stockman Family Foundation, the Singer Family Foundation, and Estelle Wolf. Additionally, the Institute for Museum and Library Services provided a grant to purchase and install state-of-the-art mobile textile art storage screens, and the National Endowment for the Arts funded research efforts in the Asian art collections. Other grants included a fellowship award from the Samuel H. Kress Foundation and a grant for conservation efforts of the AIGA archives by the Foundation of the American Institute of Graphic Arts.

The museum's nationally recognized education programming was also awarded generous support from the Institute for Museum and Library Services to partner with members of Denver's creative

community to create new models of visitor engagement. Support for our education department also came from the Virginia Hill Foundation and Colorado Creative Industries for the Native Arts Artist-in-Residence program. Additionally, Teletech continued its support of the Just For Fun Center; the Salah Foundation, Harry L. Willett, and Harley and Lorraine Higbie provided support for family programs; and Linda and John Carmain funded the museum's access programs. Further support came from the Newman Family Foundation for the studio in the Hamilton Building, Nancy Lake Benson for the innovative textile studio, and the William H. Donner Foundation for PreVIEW programs. Macy's Foundation made Untitled possible, and Mountain States Toyota generously funded Members' Previews. Once again, the Free First Saturdays were made possible by the critical support of the citizens who support the Scientific and Cultural Facilities District and sponsored by Target.

The museum's annual fundraising events were, once again, very exciting. Collectors' Choice recognized the contributions of three great patrons of the western American art department: Jim Wallace, Tom Petrie, and Henry Roath. It was co-chaired by Rhonda and Robert Boswell, Sally and Ray Duncan, Louisa and Bob Jornayvaz, Judi and Joe Wagner, and Beth and George Wood, and raised funds for a new western American art acquisitions fund. DAM Uncorked was presented by UMB Bank and Applejack Wine & Spirits and was masterfully co-chaired by Nancy Leprino-Henry, Cintra Pollack, and Amanda Precourt.

Finally, the museum's essential Annual Fund Leadership Campaign donors continued to provide significant multi-year support to help plan world-class exhibitions and programs, which were additionally sustained by the growing numbers of The Museum Associates members and DAM Good Friends donors.

On behalf of the board of trustees of the Denver Art Museum, I would like to express my gratitude for the many individuals, foundations, and corporations who graciously contributed to the successes of the Denver Art Museum this year. Thank you.



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Treasurer's Report

The Denver Art Museum carried out its mission of acquiring, interpreting, and preserving art during fiscal year 2014 with an operational increase in net assets of approximately \$877,000 due to continued fiscal discipline and better-than-expected Scientific and Cultural Facilities District tax revenues. In fiscal year 2014, SCFD provided \$6.6 million in support.

The abbreviated general operating financials shown below reflect fiscal year 2014 year-end results for the Denver Art Museum's general operating fund:

When consolidating the Denver Art Museum's overall financial condition, it is necessary to apply accrual accounting principles at the conclusion of each fiscal year in preparation for the annual certified public accounting firm audit. During fiscal year 2014, these adjustments impacted the stated net asset valuation of the Denver Art Museum. Examples of such entries include adjustments for the change in net assets held by the Denver Art Museum Foundation* for the benefit of the museum; depreciation associated with certain property, plant, and equipment owned by the museum; and acknowledgement of the present value of intended future donor contributions. The Denver Art Museum's consolidated audited statement of activities for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2014, is shown to the right.

The Denver Art Museum has concluded fiscal year 2014 with a consolidated increase in net assets of \$7.7 million dollars primarily due to the change in market value of the Denver Art Museum Foundation.

The primary fiscal goals for the future remain preserving core mission operations, managing resources to annual projected revenue, and ensuring the long-term stability of the museum.

* The Denver Art Museum Foundation (the Foundation) is a separate, tax-exempt Colorado nonprofit corporation formed to hold, manage, invest, and administer substantially all the museum's endowment funds exclusively for the benefit of the Denver Art Museum. The Foundation is governed by its board of directors, and the Foundation has legal title to and controls all funds within the Foundation, subject to any restrictions imposed by donors, until such funds are distributed to the museum by resolution of the Foundation's board. The Foundation's bylaws preclude the use of such funds as security for any obligation.

The Foundation's bylaws also provide for an annual distribution to the museum of up to four percent (increased to 4.5 percent for fiscal year 2014) of the fair market value of Foundation net assets, not including pledges receivable, for the current year and the two prior years. The calculated distribution for 2014 was \$5,262,343 and was received subsequent to year-end. Accordingly, the distribution amount is recorded as a distribution receivable from the Foundation at September 30, 2014.

** In fiscal year 2014, the museum moved into a newly constructed administration building, which was funded by private donations and net proceeds from the sale of the prior administration building.
