# THE YEAR IN REVIEW

From jewelry to painting to photography, temporary exhibitions, collections, and programs explored artistic mastery and highlighted the creative process, offering something for everyone. From slow-looking to hands-on activities to immersive experiences, the museum engaged and dazzled all the senses.

## WORLD-CLASS EXHIBITIONS

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The year began with the world-exclusive *Brilliant: Cartier in the 20th Century*, a captivating look at stunning jewelry, timepieces, and precious objects created by the world-famous design house between 1900 and 1975. While the DAM was temporarily home to a 478-carat sapphire and diamond-encrusted reptiles, the exhibition focused on the exceptional craftsmanship of the jewelers and told the story of the twentieth century through the design aesthetic of one of the world's premiere design houses.

The museum also hosted *Matisse and Friends: Selected Masterworks from the National Gallery of Art.* Visitors were invited to take their time with the 14 paintings by artists such as Henri Matisse, André Derain, and Raoul Dufy on loan from the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C.

Joan Miró: Instinct & Imagination reminded visitors that age is nothing but a number. This exhibition featured about 50 works, including rarely seen sculptures, from this iconic artist—all done in the last two decades of his career. The exhibition also served as inspiration for the play Miró, Magic & the Night co-created with Buntport Theater Company and performed for family audiences at the museum.

The summer's celebration of flowers was a feast for the senses. In the atrium, dramatic floral designs from local florists welcomed visitors to the museum. Upstairs, *In Bloom: Painting Flowers in the Age of Impressionism* featured floral still-life paintings by Manet, Degas, Renoir, Cézanne and others and included a special aromatic experience in the galleries.

The DAM's collections joined the campus-wide floral celebration with Arrangements of flower-themed artwork. These installations placed throughout the North Building highlighted the DAM's vast and varied collections.

Showing Off: Recent Modern and Contemporary Acquisitions turned the spotlight on gifts, promised gifts, and works that the museum purchased over the last seven years. Ben Jackel's giant 13-foot halberd sculpture, Pay Attention, presides over the gallery that also includes works by Nick Cave, Eric Fischl, Sol LeWitt, and Stacey Steers.

The Studio in the Hamilton Building offered visitors chances to explore their own creativity. In the course of the year, the space focused on jewelry, imagination, and flowers. Each incarnation offered hands-on activities, weekend artist demonstrations, and plenty of supplies for independent experimentation and creation.

### FREE FOR KIDS

2015 was notably marked by the introduction of a new program rooted in our commitment to lifelong creativity, self-expression, and the importance of access to art for everyone. In March, we launched Free for Kids made possible by a five-year grant from longtime supporter and trustee, Scott Reiman and supplemented with one-year support from Kaiser Permanente Colorado. Inviting all kids 18 and younger to enjoy free general admission at the museum every day allows us to be an even stronger community partner and make the museum accessible and welcoming.

We continued to provide free access to the museum during our Free First Saturdays. This past year we welcomed a new partner when Toyota began underwriting this program and our offbeat late-night art experience, Untitled Final Fridays, which is produced in collaboration with the local creative community. In 2015, the museum once again offered visitors the chance to meet and engage with artists and creatives throughout the year. Our Creative-in-Residence and Native Arts Artist-in-Residence programs allow visitors the unique and valuable chance to watch artists at work and interact with the creative process.

Our Creative-in-Residence and Native Arts Artist-in-Residence programs allow visitors the unique and valuable chance to watch artists at work and interact with the creative process.

In some ways 2015 also marked new beginnings at the museum as we look to the future. We launched a newly designed website to match the on-site experience—showcasing our wonderful assets with more visuals of our art, our buildings, and our visitors, as well as providing virtual access to thousands of objects in our collection for the first time. We also completed work on our textile collection storage system thanks to a major grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). This new system promises to streamline exhibition preparation while helping us care for and preserve our exceptional collection.

## **NEW CURATORS**

The year was bittersweet as we enthusiastically welcomed four new curators to Denver just as we also bid fond farewell

to two former colleagues. Longtime curators Alice Zrebiec, Avenir Foundation Curator of Textile Art, and Dr. Donna Pierce, Mayer Curator of Spanish Colonial Art, both moved on this past year. We will miss them and are grateful for their years of service and innumerable contributions to our program.

Tianlong Jiao, Joseph de Heer Curator of Asian Art, now oversees the museum's Asian art collection. He joined us this fall from the Asian Art Museum of San Francisco. We also welcomed Rebecca R. Hart, Polly and Mark Addison Curator of Modern and Contemporary Art. After spending 10 years at The Detroit Institute of Arts, Rebecca will manage the DAM's broad modern and contemporary art collection in partnership with Gwen Chanzit. Florence Müller, Avenir Foundation Curator of Textile Art, Curator of Fashion, will

oversee the textile art collection and expand the department to include costume and fashion of the twentieth and twenty-first centuries. Additionally, Jorge Rivas Pérez came aboard as the new Frederick & Jan Mayer Curator of Spanish Colonial Art. Bringing expertise in Latin American art, modern and contemporary art, and architecture and design, he will continue the museum's commitment to acquiring works with a Pan-American focus.





## DEVELOPMENT REPORT

The Denver Art Museum's board of trustees and members of the development committee gratefully acknowledge the contributions of the generous donors, sponsors, and members who supported the museum's exhibitions and programs in 2014–2015.

This was the year that launched the Free for Kids program with the visionary underwriting of trustee Scott Reiman, with an additional significant grant from Kaiser Permanente Colorado.

The generous support of other businesses and corporations enabled the DAM to continue to thrive and offer the ambitious exhibitions, wonderful family programming, and diverse collections that are hallmarks of the institution.

The Denver Metro area Toyota Stores made a major commitment to become the lead sponsor of Free First Saturdays and Untitled Final Fridays. Bank of Colorado's sponsorship of *Brilliant: Cartier in the 20th Century* helped to make the beacon exhibition possible, with additional support from Fine Arts Foundation and John Brooks LLC, along with event support from Cartier and Hyde Park Jewelers. Wells Fargo continued its long-standing partnership with the DAM through its sponsorship of *In Bloom: Painting Flowers in the Age of Impressionism.* Christie's funded The Museum Associates annual First 100s Luncheon as well as provided appraisal support, and U.S. Bank sponsored the *Joan Miró: Instinct & Imagination* exhibition.

For the second consecutive year, the DAM was proud to receive two major grants from the Institute of Museum and Library Services. The first grant will support the development of a Latino artist-in-residence program, the second will fund collections care through a conservation survey of the architecture, design, and graphics collections. Additional federal support came from the National Endowment for the Arts for the exhibition *Super Indian: Fritz Scholder 1967-1980*.

A challenge grant from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation to endow the textile art conservation position was successfully matched with major funding from the Avenir Foundation and other generous donors.

Other notable foundation support was generously provided by: Singer Family Foundation for the exhibitions *Matisse and Friends: Selected Masterworks from the National Gallery of Art* and *In Bloom*; E. Rhodes and Leona B. Carpenter Foundation for Asian art collection research; Robert Lehman Foundation for the exhibition *Castiglione: Lost Genius—Masterworks on Paper from the Royal Collection*; as well as funding from the Schramm Foundation.

The museum's acclaimed learning and engagement department received significant grants from: Newman Family Foundation for Studio programming; PB&K Family Foundation for the Plaza project; Sydney E. Frank Foundation-Colorado Fund

for early childhood tours; Virginia Hill Charitable Foundation for the Native Arts Artist-in-Residence program; and William H. Donner Foundation for PreVIEW educational programs on conservation. Additional support for education programs came from William Randolph Hearst Foundation; Connie Burwell White & William W. White Foundation; Harry L. Willett Foundation; Sturm Family Foundation; and Lorraine and Harley Higbie. Nancy Lake Benson continued her underwriting of the Textile Studio, as did TeleTech for Just for Fun Center—two of the museum's signature spaces.

2015 was also an important year for the new Photography Acquisitions Alliance, which raised funds for acquisitions for the permanent collection, including works by Kenneth Josephson, Laura Letinsky, and David Maisel. We appreciate the founders and donors of this exciting new group. Other noteworthy museum acquisitions included Christian Rex van Minnen's painting, *VOC Jellyfish Fry*, funded by the Ralph and Florence Burgess Trust, and a new media artwork by Daniel Brown, funded by the Florence and Ralph Burgess Trust.

The museum's fundraising events were, once again, glamorous and very successful. Celebrating its 34th year, Collectors' Choice honored Cathey Finlon for four decades of outstanding leadership and dedicated service. The event was co-chaired by Jane and Fred Hamilton and Ann and Kevin Reidy, and raised funds to support *Brilliant: Cartier in the 20th Century.* In April, the Uncorked Reserve was once again presented by long-standing museum partner UMB Bank, and the Uncorked Wine Tasting was presented by UMB Bank and Applejack Wine & Spirits. The Uncorked weekend paired special wines and fine food with world-class art and was masterfully chaired by Virginia Reiman and Tricia Youssi.

The DAM is grateful for its trustees and patrons who contribute to the Annual Fund Leadership Campaign, the multi-year fund to help plan world-class exhibitions and programs. The fund reached an all-time high in 2015, along with The Museum Associates program with more than 400 households.

Lastly, the museum was honored to be included in the estate plans of several new donors this year ensuring the museum's longevity and future success. Gifts included bequests, charitable trusts, annuities, and IRA distributions to the DAM. These generous donors have joined the Helen Dill Society in recognition for making these important commitments.

On behalf of the board of trustees of the DAM, I would like to express my thanks for the many individuals, foundations, and corporations who graciously contributed to the success of the DAM this year.

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

# TREASURER'S REPORT

The Denver Art Museum carried out its mission of acquiring, interpreting, and preserving art during fiscal year 2015 with an operational increase in net assets of \$1 million dollars due to lower than expected operating costs.

The abbreviated general operating financials shown below reflect fiscal year 2015 year-end results for the Denver Art Museum's general operating fund:

When consolidating the Denver Art Museum's overall financial condition, it is necessary to apply accrual accounting principles at the conclusion of each fiscal year in preparation for the annual certified public accounting firm audit. During fiscal year 2015, these adjustments impacted the stated net asset valuation of the Denver Art Museum. Examples of such entries include adjustments for the change in net assets held by the Denver Art Museum Foundation\* for the benefit of the Museum, depreciation associated with certain property, plant, and equipment owned by the Museum, and acknowledgement of the present value of intended future donor contributions. The Denver Art Museum's consolidated audited statement of activities for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2015, is shown to the right.

The Denver Art Museum has concluded fiscal year 2015 with a consolidated increase in net assets of \$22 million dollars. The increase in net assets is due to restricted contributions for long-term capital projects and future exhibitions.

The primary fiscal goals for the future remain preserving core mission operations, managing resources to annual projected revenue, and ensuring the long-term stability of the Museum.

\* The Denver Art Museum Foundation (the Foundation) is a separate, tax-exempt Colorado nonprofit corporation formed to hold, manage, invest, and administer substantially all the museum's endowment funds exclusively for the benefit of the Denver Art Museum. The Foundation is governed by its board of directors, and the Foundation has legal title to and controls all funds within the Foundation, subject to any restrictions imposed by donors, until such funds are distributed to the museum by resolution of the Foundation's board. The Foundation's bylaws preclude the use of such funds as security for any obligation.

The Foundation's bylaws also provide for an annual distribution to the museum of up to four percent (increased to 4.5 percent for fiscal year 2015) of the fair market value of Foundation net assets, not including pledges receivable, for the current year and the two prior years. The calculated distribution for 2015 was \$5,540,841 and was received subsequent to year-end. Accordingly, the distribution amount is recorded as a distribution receivable from the Foundation at September 30, 2015.
