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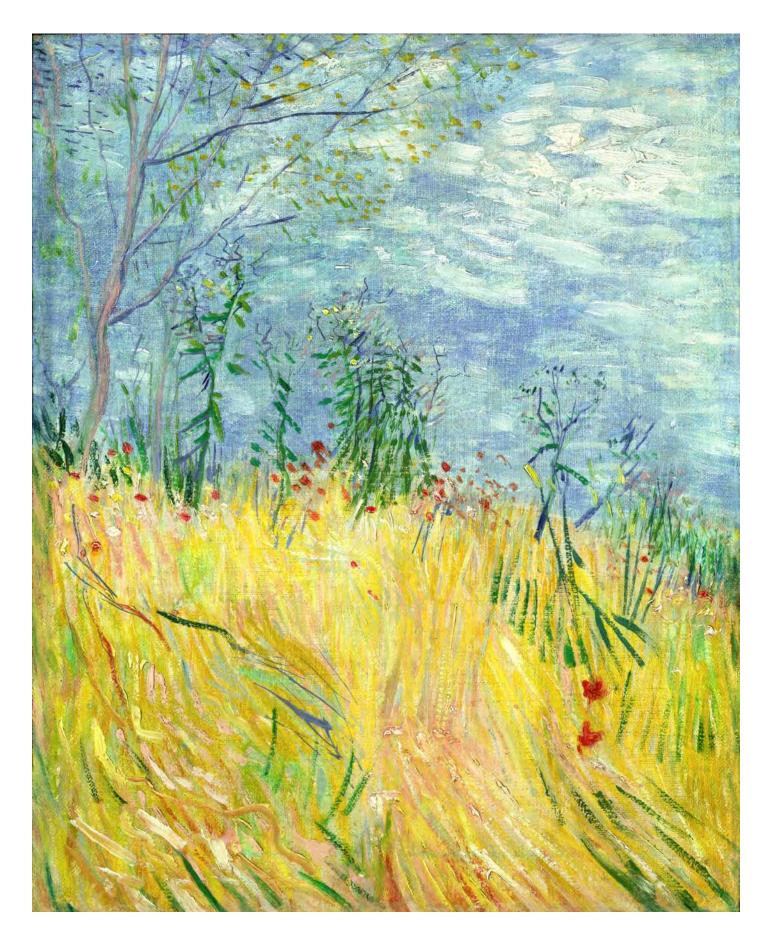

Open for...

In October 2021, the Denver Art Museum kicked off the fiscal year by opening the reimagined Martin Building and the new Sie Welcome Center. The ambitious project—from vision, to planning, to completion—took more than a decade to fully realize and the positive response from the community makes it clear that it was time well spent.

In 2022, we enthusiastically welcomed visitors to our newly expanded campus and saw an increase in attendance from the previous year as people were able to venture out once again. Through all the highs and lows of the pandemic years, the museum continued to provide inspiration and respite through both in-person and virtual programs and offerings. We remained as open to new ways of operating as we are committed to the importance of art and creativity for all.





...Discovery

The COVID-19 pandemic was still not fully behind us when we opened the full campus and the year was full of ups and downs that included renewed mask mandates, more social distancing, a few program postponements, and the ongoing need for virtual programs and events. Regardless of the challenges, it was a truly exciting year as we settled into our spaces, reintroduced many of our collections, and offered new ways to engage with and be inspired by art.

The museum engaged multiple voices and perspectives in the galleries and program spaces, prioritized access, and focused on the careful and beautiful integration of architecture, new and old. **The Martin Building renovation** got us included on Condé Nast Traveler's 2022 Hot List for Best New Museums in the World and *The New York Times* headline "What a Museum Wants to Be in the 21st Century" really said it all!

...Inspiration

In addition to our innovative permanent collection galleries, the DAM was proud to present a variety of exhibitions that introduced visitors to art and creative expression from around the world and across time. *Whistler to Cassatt: American Painters in France* started the year off with more than 100 paintings in the first comprehensive examination of France's stylistic impact on the rich complexity of American painting. *Age of Armor: Treasures from the Higgins Collection at the Worcester Art Museum* was the popular summer exhibition that highlighted the artistry, function, and societal perceptions armor shaped throughout time. The artworks in *Disruption: Works from the Vicki and Kent Logan Collection* offered a critique of current social and political narratives and questioned the world today and the social spaces we all navigate.

Our Avenir Institute of Textile Arts and Fashion hosted two exciting exhibitions this past year. The inaugural exhibition *Suited: Empowered Feminine Fashion* was followed by *Carla Fernández Casa de Moda: A Mexican Fashion Manifesto*, the first museum exhibition to fully explore the career of this artist and fashion designer, whose eponymous fashion brand aims to act as an agent of social and ethical change and innovation.

Photography was featured in many fascinating exhibitions across the campus. Following Curious Visions: Toward Abstract Photography, which opened the Photography galleries in the Martin Building, Other People's Pictures: Gifts from the Robert and Kerstin Adams Collection presented more than 70 photographic works selected from a collection donated to the DAM in 2018 by Robert and Kerstin Adams. Modern Women/Modern Vision: Works from the Bank of America Collection celebrated the dynamic contributions of women to the development and evolution of photography in the twentieth century. And this past summer, the museum was pleased to present Georgia O'Keeffe, Photographer, organized by the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, in partnership with the Georgia O'Keeffe Museum, which revealed a new aspect of the beloved modernist's career.

Ancient and contemporary Latin American art was featured in multiple exhibitions throughout the year. ReVisión: Art in the Americas displayed nearly 180 objects from the museum's Ancient American and Latin American Art collections in the newly opened Bonfils-Stanton Gallery. We are pleased that this exhibition will have a new audience and more attention when it travels to the Minneapolis Institute of Art (Mia). Traitor, Survivor, Icon: The Legacy of La Malinche was the first museum exhibition to present a comprehensive visual exploration of this enigmatic figure's enduring impact on communities living on both sides of the US-Mexico border. This exhibition, which was organized by the DAM, toured to two other museums following the presentation in Denver. Who tells a tale adds a tail: Latin America and contemporary art featured the work of 19 young, Latin American contemporary artists who explore relevant social and political themes through a multitude of media including, but not limited to, painting, sculpture, textile, video, and performance art.



The winter months were challenging as restrictions came back and we were unable to use our spaces the way we had envisioned for so long. But by spring 2022, we were grateful to host in-person events like Luncheon by Design. **Please turn to the Development Report on page 52 to read more about some of the exciting events, informative talks, and delightful celebrations we offered for patrons, friends, and the general public.**

We were pleased to host more than 11,000 visitors on our campus for two community-focused festivals. In April, the 20th annual Día del Niño, a free event celebrating children, featured performances and artmaking activities for the whole family. And in September, we were home to the 33rd annual Friendship Powwow, which included music and dance performances, artmaking opportunities, and local Native artists and vendors showcasing jewelry, art, crafts, and more.

...Families

Many onsite programs that had been on hiatus during the pandemic returned over the last year. We welcomed kids aged 5–12 back to our popular day camps. It was fun to see the spaces we had envisioned for our youngest visitors buzzing with activity again.

Since March 2015, the DAM has been committed to offering free general admission to all visitors 18 years of age and younger through our Free for Kids program.

Our world-class Learning and Engagement department continued to develop programs that boost creativity for visitors and community members of all ages. We remain focused on welcoming the broadest spectrum of the Denver community through our doors and to our programs. This focus is both on our internal policies and trainings that further our goals around building a more diverse and equitable workplace, as well as how we reach and serve all visitors. Dedicated and enthusiastic staff members and volunteers took to the streets (figuratively and literally) to engage with community members and share the power of art and creativity. Team members joined local creatives in sponsored booths at the Juneteenth Festival, they marched and danced in the Denver Pride parade, and sponsored art activities at the Dragon Boat Festival. 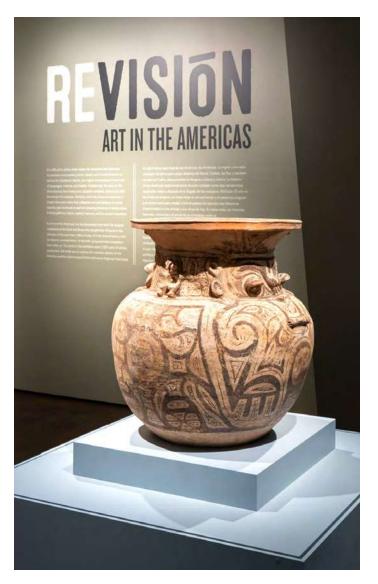

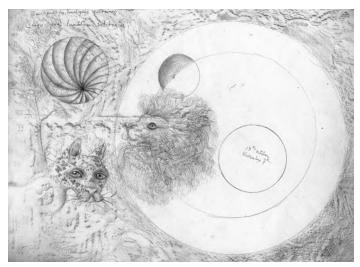

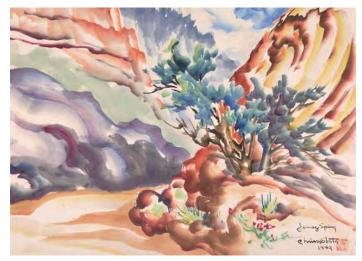

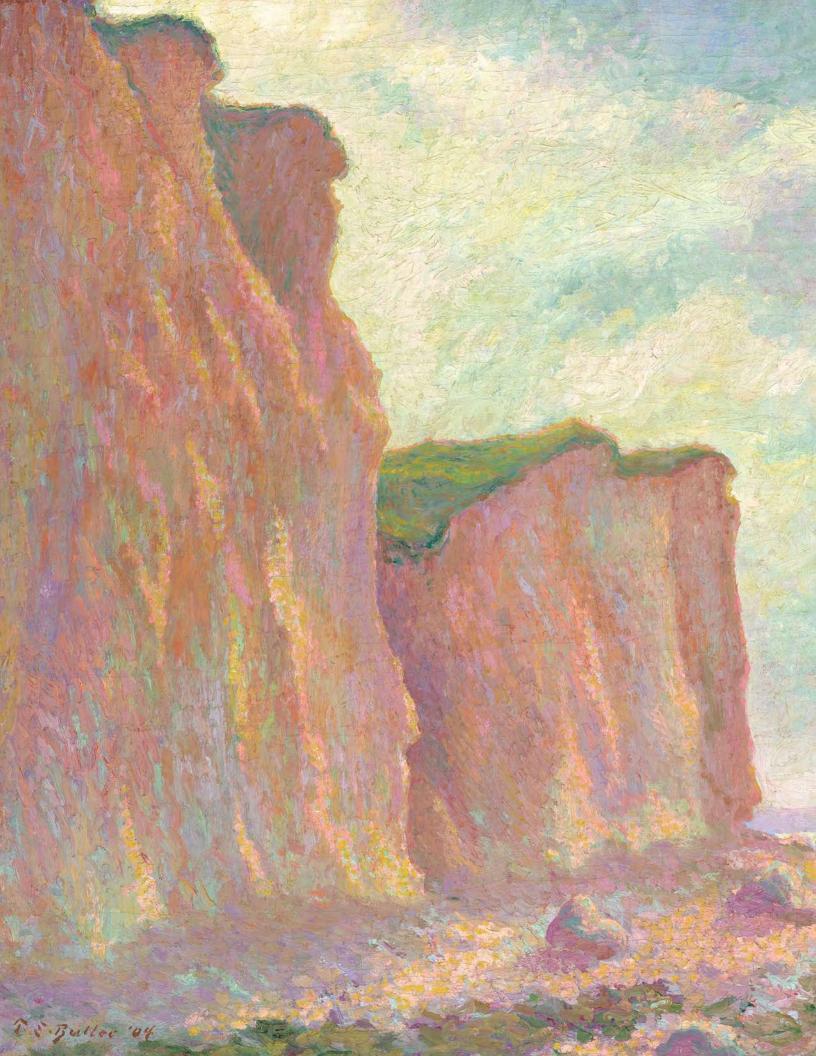

Learning & Engagement Report

Open for Creativity

The highlight of the year had to be the opening of the Jana and Fred Bartlit Learning and Engagement Center, a place for visitors to engage with art and creativity for moments of healing, celebration, and joy. With over 22,000 square feet of flexible indoor and outdoor programming space on two levels, our footprint expanded to include four workshops, the Creative Hub, and three outdoor terraces.

The heartbeat of the Learning and Engagement Center is the Creative Hub with hands-on activities co-created with Denver-based artists Moe Gram and Frankie Toan. Throughout the year, we hosted various creative convenings in the Creative Hub including: Print Jam, which celebrated Denver's Month of Printing in March 2022, bringing the artistic skills of 15 local printmakers to the campus through 14 live demonstrations and three hands-on workshops. Untitled, our quarterly Friday-night program, worked with over 75 artists, including our featured artists: musician Felix Ayodele and artist Alejandra Abad (October); visual artist and muralist Danielle SeeWalker and musician and visual artist Bianca Mikahn (April); painter and sculptor Robert Martin and playwright and spoken-word artist Jeff Campbell (June); and multimedia artist Sam Grabowska and printmaker and multimedia artist Javier Flores (July).

Our Creative-in-Residence program returned after a year hiatus. Working out of the Creative Hub, Kerrie Joy, a Denver-based poet, singer/songwriter, and storyteller, took inspiration from exhibitions and collections to create public engagement moments rooted in poetry, art, and fashion. We also welcomed back the Native Arts Artist-in-Residence program with Steven Yazzie, whose residency included creating a film with visitors.







In the Hamilton Building, the Studio became the Storytelling Studio and was open daily, offering visitors an opportunity to tell their own stories through the power of text and image, connect with artworks on view, and engage with Denver-area creatives. 57,913 visitors participated in the Storytelling Studio. We partnered with two featured artists and 10 demonstrating artists who displayed their work and demonstrated their artistic practice for visitors.

Open for Community

Throughout the year, we honored creativity in our community, and started our community showcase program in the Creative Hub and in the Wonderscape. Exhibitions this year included *Photography and Memory Project: Connecting Generations Through Stories and Images*, an intergenerational partnership program from the Denver Public Library and University of Denver; and *Queer Creativity Through the Ages: Artwork from The Center on Colfax Open Art Studio* done in partnership with The Center on Colfax West of 50 program. The creativity of youth was in full display in Wonderscape. This year, we worked with Denver Public Schools and Scholastic to bring the work of over 400 students to the museum. We also showcased the work of art museum staff in an inaugural exhibition.

Built in partnership with Denver Botanic Gardens, the new Sensory Garden celebrates the importance of creativity and nature as crucial ingredients for individual and societal well-being. The Sensory Garden and the Ruby Room hosted programs such as Mindful Looking, Drop-in Drawing, and Drop-in Writing, and a new program we launched this fall, Create Café.

With continued impacts from the pandemic and with the acknowledgement that art and creativity are essential for communities to thrive, the team delivered museum programs in community at schools, community centers, and older adult communities. Art Lives Here was installed at three partner sites; 6,770 Creativity Kits were distributed to youth and families; and Art at Hand, museum experiences in a box, were distributed to 133 older adults through our partners The Center on Colfax West of 50 program, Center for African American Health, Catholic Charities, Mulroy Senior Center, and Kinship Caregivers group.

Open for Learning & Fun

After a four-year hiatus, we brought back adult artmaking classes. Creative Classes is a brand-new series, taking advantage of the new workshops and the museum's strong network with Denver's creative community. Each class was uniquely designed by a creative educator for an adult audience, with specific connections to the museum's exhibitions and collections. Twenty-one classes were offered, ranging from wet felting and wood-cut printing to mixed-media collage and weaving.

As an incubator and hub for practitioners, peers, and those who are committed to the role of creativity and art in society, this year we convened and hosted two important gatherings. The team hosted the Association of Art Museum Interpretation, welcoming 67 interpretation colleagues from all over the US and Canada; and we organized a Creative Aging and Well-Being convening with 64 attendees from across Colorado and the nation.

After a pandemic that put school programs on hold for almost two years, students returned to the museum beginning in January of 2022 with access to new offerings focused on building connections, sparking curiosity, and inspiring critical thinking. Approximately 23,000 students took part in a range of museum experiences in the galleries, in the new workshops, as part of a guided tour, and on self-guided tours. Our offerings expanded to include K-12 artmaking workshops designed to facilitate an open studio process, modeled after the Teaching for Artistic Behavior philosophy. As an amplification to our elementary tours, we began middle and high school discovery-based tours focused on art and social consciousness. Our work with teachers came back onsite. We hosted the Teaching Artistic Behavior Conference in January and held our first Educator Open House with a combined 180 teachers.

Welcoming families back to the museum with a range of programming was a priority. This year saw the return of Foxy and Shmoxy, two witty foxes solving mysterious cases involving artworks in the galleries. Using a humorous storytelling-performance format, Foxy and Shmoxy help young children and their grown-ups access and experience artworks in unique ways. Five performances were held January through May.

With the goal of offering safe and engaging visits for kids with sensory sensitivities, Sensory-Friendly Mornings were reimagined, and held four times over the course of the year, in partnership with McNicholas Miniature Therapy Horses and Revel in Life as well as artist partners in the community.

Family Central opened as a "porch" for visiting families where they can relax, rejuvenate, and play. New activities focused on acting out stories in colorful costumes, building sculptures with wooden blocks, and creating artworks to fit in a miniature museum.

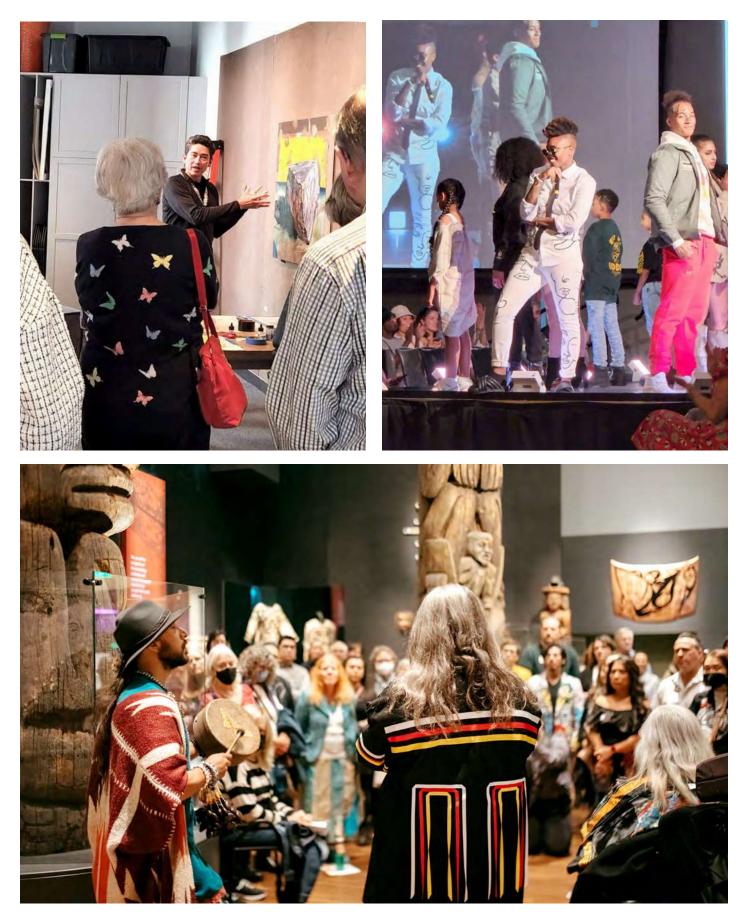
We also welcomed kids back to the museum for a new program offering, Day at the DAM. Twelve camps were offered, designed for kids ages 6–11 to spend a day at the museum making art and learning from local teaching artists and museum staff during holidays and break weeks. Throughout the summer, 500 campers ages 4–12 worked alongside teaching artists, who taught 27 Summer Camps, visiting galleries, finding their creative voices, and learning fun skills such as designing NFTs.

Selected Museum Programs

Highlights of programs the museum presented October 1, 2021–September 30, 2022.

COURSES

Behind the Camera: Women in Photography

This three-part course delved into women's contributions to the development and evolution of photography, exploring women's early involvement in the medium, taking a peek into the DAM's own collections, and introducing photographers who continue to shape the field today.

Featured speakers: Kara Felt, PhD; Kimberly Roberts, DAM Senior Curatorial Assistant of Photography; and the following photographers: Susan Goldstein, Renluka Maharaj, and Jasmine Abena Colgan.

Drawn to France: American Painters & Their Patrons

This four-part course in conjunction with *Whistler to Cassatt: American Painters in France* explored the lure of France for American artists and patrons in the 19th and early 20th centuries.

Featured speakers: Timothy J. Standring, DAM Curator Emeritus; Annette Stott, Professor of Art History at the University of Denver; Giulia Bernardini, Senior Instructor of Humanities at University of Colorado, Boulder; and Emily C. Burns, Associate Professor of Art History at Auburn University.

SYMPOSIA

Dressing for the Creator: Indigenous Art and the Power of Spectacle

At this biannual symposium, the Native Arts department invited four Native artists to speak about the importance of dress and adornment for Indigenous people and to discuss how they approach artistic markets while remaining grounded in and respectful of their community histories and established visual canons.

Earthworks: Land Art in the West

To mark the 50th anniversary of Christo and Jeanne-Claude's *Valley Curtain*, a dramatic installation in the Colorado landscape, the Petrie Institute of Western American Art's 16th annual symposium explored the history of land art in the West. Making interventions in the landscape and often using earth itself as a medium, artists in the late 1960s and 1970s reimagined artmaking and subverted art world norms. Speakers considered historical contexts of earthworks—both ancient and contemporary—as well as individual artists and their contributions to land art.

ReVisión: A New Look at Art in the Americas

Inspired by the exhibition *ReVisión: Art in the Americas*, the 20th Annual Mayer Center for Ancient and Latin American Art Symposium focused on the art of the Americas as a single interwoven story by collapsing time and distance to connect history, legend, memory, and the present.

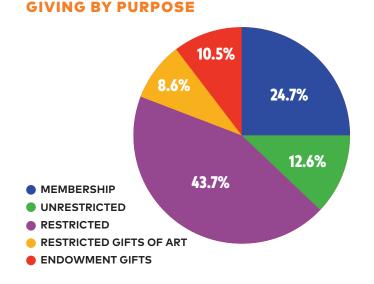
Development Report

A series of celebrations followed, including the Grand Opening Reception that offered a very special preview of the Martin Building to museum patrons and The Museum Associates, featuring curators across departments and their inaugural exhibitions. Full Circle, a housewarming party celebrating the Gio Pontidesigned building's 50th anniversary and its exciting next chapter, was sponsored by CultureHaus and filled with artists, community partners, young and new supporters, and museum patrons alike.

Uncorked, the annual fundraising event celebrating art, wine, and community, marked its 20th anniversary on a beautiful June evening. Music was woven throughout the evening, with a performance by the band Mama Magnolia as the hallmark of the dinner program. The event was presented by Sharon & Lanny Martin, Amanda J. Open for World-Class Art

The museum's exhibitions were supported by the Annual Fund Leadership Campaign donors, The Museum Associates, and generous sponsors listed on pages 21, 22, and 23.

The Annual Fund Leadership Campaign (AFLC) supporters reached over 100 households and provided over \$2 million of exhibitions and programs support to help the museum plan and execute its world-class programs.

We are grateful also to The Museum Associates. Over 400 households participated in exciting social and educational opportunities throughout the year. We also want to acknowledge the important support that comes from all our new and renewing corporate members, especially the leadership and longstanding commitment of UMB Bank at the Chairman's Circle level.

Open for Diverse Voices

Generous supporters made restricted gifts to advance institutional initiatives. Your 6 Front Range Toyota Stores, along with funding from the residents who support the Scientific and Cultural Facilities District (SCFD), continued to make year-round Free Days and annual programs Día del Niño and Friendship Powwow possible. Broad support of the museum's acquisitions came from Collectors' Groups members helping to enhance collections while enjoying access to events, lectures, and insider opportunities with curators.

Murff, US. And lastly, the Textile and Fashion Circle supported the purchase of a collection of looks, objects, and videos by Carla Fernández, Mexico.

The museum engaged audiences with creative programs at the museum and in the community thanks to support from the Aegon Transamerica Foundation, US Bank Foundation, and Xcel Energy Foundation, who provided funding for Art Lives Here/El Arte Vive Aquí installations serving thousands of children in schools and community centers and almost 7,000 Creativity Kits which were delivered to teachers and schools throughout the metro area.

Now in its third full year, the Museum Friends membership program continues to offer members deeper museum involvement and access to educational, social, and enrichment opportunities. To kick off the year, Museum Friends were invited to a special preview of the Martin Building opening in October 2021. Throughout the year, Museum Friends enjoyed free admission to more than 30 lectures as well as discounted pricing on two courses and three symposia. Additionally, Friends received invitations to social and enrichment events hosted by each curatorial department.

Significant new Vision 2021 campaign gifts were made by Jana and Fred Bartlit in support of the Learning and Engagement Center, by Robert and Judi Newman underwriting the outdoor Ellipse, as well as by Denise and Scott Hasday, MCD Richmond American Homes Foundation, the Congdon Family, and Mary Reisher and Barry Berlin.

Restricted funding also sustained essential work like conservation and the care of museum collections. The Institute of Museum and Library Services awarded a grant to support improvements to collections storage, the second grant awarded for this two-phase project that will significantly improve storage and access to large-scale paintings and two-dimensional artworks. Korea Foundation underwrote a conservation survey of Korean art.

Generous endowment gifts were made by the Wiegers Family Foundation for the museum's acquisitions, and Mary Ellen Anderson who launched a Conservation Endowment matching fund. The Hamilton Building Studio centered on the art of storytelling and was supported by the Robert & Judi Newman Family Endowment. Treasurer's Report

In early fiscal 2022, the Denver Art Museum celebrated the opening of the Martin Building to the public. This was shortly followed by a recurrence of COVID-19 and operating restrictions. The museum ended the year with growing attendance, a rise in membership, and the return of event activities at the campus.

The museum, even with these constraints, delivered on its mission with such exhibitions as *Whistler to Cassatt: American Painters in France; Georgia O'Keeffe, Photographer; and Carla Fernández Casa de Moda: A Mexican Fashion Manifesto.*

The museum operating expenses were \$38.7 million, excluding \$8.2 million in depreciation expense. Operations were supported with revenues and support of \$36.3 million and use of strategic revenues. A special thank you to the extraordinary support of \$9.9 million provided by citizens of the seven-county metro Scientific and Cultural Facilities District (SCFD).

Non-operating activities are gifts restricted for endowments, capital projects, and art acquisitions and reduced by endowment gifts transferred to the museum's Foundation, and art acquisitions. These activities are essential to the museum's ability to deliver on its mission.

The museum ended the fiscal year in a healthy financial position that will sustain our core mission operations during fiscal 2023 as we continue to emerge from the impacts of the pandemic.

The Denver Art Museum Foundation (the Foundation) is a separate, tax-exempt Colorado nonprofit corporation formed to hold, manage, invest, and administer substantially all the museum's endowment funds exclusively for the benefit of the Denver Art Museum. The Foundation is governed by its board of directors, and controls all funds within the Foundation, subject to any restrictions imposed by donors, until such funds are distributed to the museum by resolution of the Foundation's board. The Foundation's bylaws preclude the use of such funds as security for any obligation.

The Foundation's bylaws also provide for an annual distribution to the museum of 4.5 percent of the fair market value of Foundation net assets, not including pledges receivable, for each of the prior twelve quarters falling within the current year and the two prior years. The calculated distribution for 2022 was \$7,403,783 and was received subsequent to year-end.

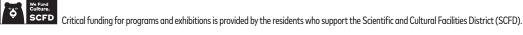
