Specially trained docents are available to answer questions and share the stories behind works of art on view. Drop in on multiple talks through the day to create your own customized tour. Sensory-Friendly Mornings

The museum will open early, dim the lights, and provide tools to aid and guide a sensory-friendly experience for the whole family. Components available in Spanish.
